He and Jo will fly off to Capetown for a few days of luxury early in the New Year and guess who is left holding .....? Actually you may recall that Jo's parents are also local to this area so we actually compete (in the nicest possible way) for the 'privilege' of exercising out grandparent skills - spoiling them, cuddling Lorna and persuading Sam that Noddy would eat sausages & mashed potato without leaving any. Actually it can be hard work and it is super to be able to share the responsibility with Jo's mum & dad who are in fact lovely people and delightful to share with.

Charlotte is very happy and also very busy at the moment. She lives in Wimbledon and works for the Reed Employment Agency as a personnel adviser (recruitment interviews etc). She has been away on a number of training

We would both like to spend a little more time in France if we could - certainly basking in sunshine, swimming in the sea and cycling in the pine forest are high on our list of retirement priorities.
